What have we been doing since our last update in June – apart from having fun (see the back page)?

Repairs – Vital electrical repairs have been done, and we've installed additional electrics to enable the church to host concerts and festivals.

We've got permission from the Diocese to install our new boiler and these works will be completed by the end of September – warmth is on its way...

We were shocked to discover, after the clock had gone away for repair, how unsafe was the upper floor on which it lives – there is a missing joist and much rotten wood, and some huge gaps. These will be repaired soon, and the clock reinstalled after that.

With the help of a determined locksmith we have managed to pick the lock of the vestry door, said not to have been opened in 60 years – yet it is a vital part of the fire escape plan!







We are working to secure the belfry louvres from the roosting jackdaws, now the families have flown.



Planning the church works – We work very closely with our architect, John Scott. John did the Quinquennial Report which is the guide for the repair work we need to do. Coming up are: the west window, the tower, and further roof investigations. He's also a member of the Diocesan Advisory Committee who have to approve most of what we do. With John's help we are seeking tenders from specialist church restorers for the works to be done over the next few months.







Sadly, not many people get to see the magnificent views from the tower, or many of the more intriguing parts of the historic building. The lead on the tower roof is old and brittle and the foot and hand graffiti of long-gone Harbertonians hasn't really helped keep the timbers waterproof - but the dates prove that the lead has been up there for at least 175 years. It hasn't done badly!

The picture on the left shows the fine ancient timbers of the underside of the tower roof.

The difference you make – making the church a place for all can only happen if that ambition has your support. Our lovely summer has been made more glorious by the enthusiasm shown by so many in the parish, and beyond, for this project – by coming to events, by spending money, by asking great questions, and by offering to help with other events and tasks. The funds raised are just brilliant, but equally important is the wonderful experience of so many of us coming out to play, to chat, and to enjoy and support our community.

Since the last update we have loved seeing hundreds of happy people taking part in:

The 1st Rounders Day and Children's Races on 1 July – so many determined teams, so much cake, burgers, bar, tea and chat. After costs, this raised £668.

The 1st Harberton Secret Gardens Day on 22 July – many of our marvellous gardeners worked hard to enable hundreds of people to have a lovely afternoon visiting their gardens – followed by a delicious cream tea with Pimm's in the church. After costs, this raised £1.124.

Every penny of this money will be kept in the Harberton Church Community Fund charity account and spent only on works to our church.
