

The Launch Lunch to kickstart our Capital Appeal was a joyous occasion, with so many people from our community coming together to share food and celebrate what we can achieve as one. Since that lovely August day many of you have given generously, with time and money, to great effect.

How much has the Tick Tock Appeal raised so far? In its first months just over £37,500 has been raised – this is a wonderful, amazing, 75% of our target of £50,000. This money has come from people making donations (including Gift Aid); attending events – and even buying our Harberton greetings cards (available at any time in the church). Church Council members have asked us to congratulate all concerned on the fantastic total raised so far and to thank the organisers and all in the local community for their contributions towards the tower and window repairs.

Is this all that is needed to repair our tower and windows?

The Church Council has calculated that £80,000 is needed for these works. With the funds raised and a small grant from the National Churches Trust, they are now booking in the window repairs. And the Heritage Lottery Fund have advised us that, while the works are eligible for a grant, we would have a much greater chance of receiving one if about 50% of the funds had already been secured, and if community support could be demonstrated. Your involvement, your generosity and your interest have put the Church Council in a great position to submit a compelling funding application.

So, are we stopping fundraising? No! As we said when we launched the appeal, there is lots to do. First, we want to reach our £50,000 target for the Tick Tock Appeal. Then we want to hear from the Church Council and our community to see what repairs and improvements to do next.

What will we see for our money, once the Tick Tock works have been done? The key ambition is for our clock to be back in place, in good health, telling us the time again. And never to see buckets again at the bottom of the tower collecting internal dripping water. And to stop worrying

about our lovely windows crashing down around our ears. And to know that our bells are in good condition and can ring well and safely for many years.
